## Lesson Plan: Faith Ringgold And Her Story Quilts

Grade Level - 2-5. Builds skills in art, social studies, and language arts

Concept/Goal: Art can be used to record historical or personal events.

Resources: My Dream of Dr. Martin Luther King by Faith Ringgold (or Tar Beach)

Crayons, Paper, and Glue

Summary: Each student will make a drawing of an important event in the life of Martin Luther King Jr. Once completed, they can be quilted together and displayed to celebrate Black History Month. (Note: this can be changed to another person's life, or even the students' own lives, depending on what's going on in your classroom)

- **1. Introduce the art piece:** (5 min) Start by presenting the artist Faith Ringgold, an American artist who began her career more than 35 years ago as a painter. Today, she is best known for her painted story quilts -- art that combines painting, quilted fabric and storytelling. Share the art piece and show how this quilt tells a story.
- 2. **Reading (10 min)** Faith Ringgold has written and illustrated several children's books—many of them based on her own childhood experiencs. Read her book entitled, <u>My Dream of Dr. Martin Luther King</u> or <u>Tar Beach.</u> Or you can tailor the book to a story the kids have learned about recently, like the Three Little Pigs.
- **3. Discuss the story.**: (5 min) What parts of the story do you remember? What details do you think need to be included to understand the story?
- **4. Project**: (30 min) Creating the "squares" for the story quilt. You can modify this if you're doing a different story. (While doing the project, you can listen to any music you think works with the theme.)
  - Students will be given a slip of paper with a caption from the timeline of Dr. King's life from the back section of Ringgold's book.
  - With that event in mind, each student will make a drawing to tell about that event.
  - When they are done with their drawing, they will glue their statement of the event to the bottom of their artwork and make a decorative border around their square.
  - After all the drawings are done, the children will glue (or tape which would be less permanent) their own drawing in order of when it happened in Dr. King's life.
  - The outcome will be a quilt-like design that celebrates Black History Month, the life of Dr. King, and the art of Faith Ringgold.
- **5.** Closure: (5 min) Ideally each student can say something about his or her drawing and explain what is going on, but depending on time you might just have a few volunteers do so.
- **6. Personal Connection:** (5 min) Explain that even though these drawings were to represent the events in Dr. King's life, they could also do this for themselves, to record their own life experiences.

Time Flow: 60 Minutes Total

Back-up Lesson: The students can make a drawing of an important event from their own lives. (If time is tighter, the book reading can be left off.)
